Long term disability


No one can predict the future course of their health. That's why we offer a full range of comprehensive and portable disability insurance products that you can rely on throughout your working years.

Industry statistics¹ show that the risk of becoming disabled due to illness or injury during a person's working years is considerably higher than the risk of premature death. For disabilities that last for more than 90 days, the average claim will be longer than three years.

That's a long time to be without a paycheque!

In 2007, we took a look at our long term claims to see how many had lasted for more than five years, and the nature of those disabilities. The most frequent cause of such disabilities is musculoskeletal conditions. These range from degenerative disc disease to arthritis to more generalized problems with the back and joints. The next most frequent causes are mental and nervous disorders, including major depression and bipolar disorder.

For about one third of our long term disability claims, critical illness coverage may have also paid a benefit.
